will be the theme for the annual meeting of the Society of Economic Botany to be held in Fort Worth June 5-9.

Symposia topics include:

- Pharmacopeia of Indigenous Peoples: The Polynesian and Micronesian Pacific
- Conserving Genetic Diversity and Indigenous Knowledge of Food Crops in Northern Mexico and Tropical America
- Archaeobotany and Paleoethnobotany in Mexico: complementary approaches to the analysis and interpretation of archaeological plant remains
- The Economic Importance of the Anacardiaceae
- Where the West Begins and Why: An Ancient Ethnobotanical Boundary

Authors of contributed papers are from Europe, North America, South America, Africa, India, Hawaii, and Southeast Asia, and topics range widely from general methodologies, traditional and current medicine, phytochemistry, indigenous knowledge and traditional uses, stimulant plants, taxonomy, habitat classification, forest management, and sustainable use.

Day trips to Fort Worth's cultural district, historical sites and the nature center are scheduled for Sunday, June 5. A post-conference trip will guide participants through the scenic Texas Hill Country. Hats and boots not required!
